Purpose for the Pilgrimage of Hope

Dear Pilgrims,

Life is a journey—and you're not walking it alone. Every one of us is on a path, searching for meaning, for love, for something more. That's what a **pilgrimage of hope** is all about. It's not just about going somewhere; it's about discovering who we are and who God is calling us to be. Pope Francis said, "Life is a journey. When we stop, things don't go right." That's why we keep moving forward, even when it's tough. Hope is what keeps us going. It's not pretending everything is perfect—it's trusting that God is with us, even when things are messy.

Hope is powerful. It's what helps you get up after a bad day, what gives you strength when you feel alone, and what reminds you that your life has purpose. The world might try to make you feel small or discouraged, but God sees greatness in you.

And here's the best part: we don't walk alone. We walk **together**. As Church, as friends, as a community. Pope Francis calls us "pilgrims of hope and builders of peace." That means we're not just walking for ourselves—we're walking for others too. For those who are hurting, for those who feel forgotten, for those who need someone to believe in them.

So what does this look like in real life? It's choosing kindness when it's easier to ignore. It's standing up for someone who's being left out. It's praying when you don't have the words. It's trusting that God has a plan, even when you can't see it yet.

Mary, the Mother of Jesus, walked her own pilgrimage of hope. She trusted God completely, even when she didn't understand everything. Let's ask her to walk with us too.

So keep walking. Keep hoping. Keep believing. Because your journey matters—and God is walking every step with you.





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Station 1: St Andrew's Primary School Ferny Grove

In this Jubilee year St Andrew's celebrates 40 years.

Welcome! We invite you to take time to sit on the hill. Today we will invite you to take time to reflect on a scriptural text using an ancient form of prayer known as Lectio Divina. The process is written below.

As part of this is included some thoughts from the founding principal Sr Marie Casamento. As we reflect on 40 years of St Andrew's in this pilgrim year, we are invited to consider the role schools play in educating future generations who will need to meet the challenges of today and the future. As Pope Francis called us to be Pilgrims of Hope, we recognise the challenges faced by the world and the importance of imparting a sense of hope in our children.

Lectio Divina

1. Lectio - reading

Read the scripture text aloud or quietly, be slow and thoughtful with your reading

2. Meditatio – meditating

Read aloud until a word or phrase stands out to you. Sit with that word or phrase and allow it to make an impression on you. Notice how you feel about it. What is it saying to you in your life right now?

3. Oratio – praying

Pray using the word or phrase that stood out for you. This prayer is a result of your experience of the Scripture. Pray for the grace to devote yourself to what God is calling you to be.

4. Comtemplatio - contemplating

Sit in silence for a while, reflecting on the Scripture passage and how God is working in your life today. In particular how are you called as a pilgrim of hope.

5. Actio – action

Give thought to what you can do to make the change you have been called to make. Reach out to others in prayer or in person. Keep coming back to the prayer every time you think of it through the day.

The First Disciples of Jesus (Lectio) John 1:35-42

The next day John again was standing with two of his disciples, and as he watched Jesus walk by, he exclaimed, "Look, here is the Lamb of God!" The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus. When Jesus turned and saw them following, he said to them, "What are you looking for?" They said to him, "Rabbi" (which translated means Teacher), "where are you staying?" He said to them, "Come and see." They came and saw where he was staying, and they remained with him that day. It was about four o'clock in the afternoon. One of the two who heard John speak and followed him was Andrew, Simon Peter's brother. He first found his brother Simon and said to him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated Anointed!!). He brought Simon!!! to Jesus, who looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You are to be called Cephas" (which is translated Peter!!!).

First Principal's Sr Marie Casamento reflections on the beginning of St Andrew's school

The design for the logo was created by Patricia Murray from Woolloongong. At the time she was a Good Samaritan Sister. The design is of the children holding hands around the Word, or the Book of Gospels and goes with the motto to 'Attend with a Listening Heart' and the name St. Andrew's School.

We joined with St William's School staff prior to school beginning for a staff day conducted by Dr. Kevin Treston. For his address he spoke of the gospel way of life and mentioned the contributions religious orders had contributed to education. He said he particularly liked St. Benedict's call for his monks in the school of the Lord's service, to 'Attend with a listening heart' and went on to illuminate the text.

Several of the initial staff nudged me as we sat in a row and said 'the motto for the School'? Thus working on that as a motto, and the name suggested by Fr. Brian Daley, we put it to the parents and the rest is history.

Andrew was the apostle who led his brother Peter to Jesus, hence we focused on recognising Jesus in our midst and in each other. Andrew was the apostle who found the child with the five loaves and two fishes, hence the educational philosophy centred on seeing the potential in each child. Andrew being one of the twelve hence the joining of hands on the journey because any journey in life is a community, a 'we' together journey.



Reflection Questions

Andrew is a man who pays attention – he follows Jesus and tells his brother Simon "We have found the messiah". When have you paid attention and noticed or felt Christ present in your life?

How can you practice listening with the ear of your heart? Who needs to be heard with heart?

Andrew is an apostle who shows initiative and courage. Reflect on someone you know who have these qualities – bring them to heart and mind? What other qualities do they demonstrate?


Every community has its beginning – the Christian community, our own St Andrew's community. How do you contribute to the vitality of the communities to which you belong?

Station 2: Our Lady of Dolours Parish Church Mitchelton

We come to Our Lady of Dolours Church today as pilgrims on a journey, our own journey. At this church we remember the sorrows that crossed Mary's life, and seek her comfort and encouragement as we reflect on our own.

Mary has many titles but under the title of Our lady of Dolours we have the opportunity to contemplate seven events in her life which are recognised as the seven sorrows that cover the life span of Jesus and were occasions of sufferings for His mother. Knowing Mary's experience our faith encourages us to go to her for strength and support when our own journey presents burdens, sometimes heavy ones that seem too hard to carry alone.


The seven sorrows for meditation and reflection are:

- 1. The Prophecy of Simeon: Simeon prophesies that a sword (of sorrow) will pierce Mary's soul as she presents Infant Jesus in the Temple.
- 2. The Flight into Egypt: Mary and Joseph flee to Egypt with the Infant Jesus to escape King Herod's persecution.
- 3. The Loss of Jesus in the Temple: Mary and Joseph search for the young Jesus for three days, eventually finding him in the Temple.
- 4. Mary meeting Jesus on the way to Calvary: Mary encounters her son, Jesus on the road to his crucifixion, witnessing his suffering.
- 5. The Crucifixion of Jesus: Mary stands at the foot of the cross as her son Jesus is crucified.
- 6. The taking down of Jesus from the cross: Mary receives her son's body after his crucifixion.
- 7. The burial of Jesus: Mary witnesses the burial of Jesus, experiencing the finality of his death.

Mary's faith enabled her to hope and always trust in God, so we pray that she will be our constant companion as we continue our life's journey and encounter our own sorrows from time to time.

Caring for Our Common Home – Inspired by Pope Francis and Laudato Si'





Reflection Journey

Scripture: Genesis 2:15

The Lord God took the man and put him in the garden of Eden to till it and keep it.

Laudato Si' and Pope Francis remind us

that caring for creation is both a spiritual calling and a responsibility we share as members of the human family. Our earth, "our common home," is a precious gift entrusted to us by God. Every tree, river, and creature is part of a delicate balance that sustains life. When we protect and nurture the environment, we honor the Creator and safeguard the wellbeing of all, especially the most vulnerable. In our modern lives, it can be easy to forget our connection to nature amidst routines and distractions. Pope Francis urged us to slow down, notice the beauty around us, and recognise how our actions—big or small—have an impact on the world. By making mindful choices and treating the earth with respect, we sow seeds of peace and hope for future generations.

Please take time to find a spot on the oval to sit and enjoy God's goodness all around you.

As you embark on your "Care for Creation" meditation, pause and breathe mindfully. Feel the ground beneath your feet as a reminder of God's presence in all things. Consider carrying a leaf or small stone as a sign of your intention to protect our planet.

As you ponder the call to stewardship, consider these further questions for reflection:

- In what ways do I experience God's presence in nature?
- How can I foster greater gratitude for the earth's gifts?
- What habits might I change to reduce harm to creation?
- Who inspires me to care for our planet, and how can I encourage others?
- How do my spiritual beliefs shape my response to the environmental challenges facing our world?
- How do my daily choices affect the environment?
- What can I do to bring healing and peace to the earth—our common home?

Creator God,

Open our hearts to see your handiwork in all of creation. Help us to care for the earth with wisdom, gratitude, and compassion. Strengthen us to be faithful stewards, living in harmony with all that you have made. May our actions bring renewal and peace to our world.



Pause in silent prayer.


Reflection Questions

Station 4: St William's Primary School Grovely

Scripture: John 14:27

Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid.

Labyrinth Walk

A labyrinth is a guided symbolic, meditative "journey" into the "center" of ourselves. Labyrinths are complex, geometric designs which follow one long path that leads to the center and always leads back out to the beginning. They have no wrong way and are not intended to trick or confuse like a maze! They cause us to stop the daily routine, slow down and walk unfamiliar ways so that we can think about who we really are and what life is about.

Make your way to the St William's Labyrinth on the school oval, walk through the Charism Walk to the Labyrinth

Before you begin, center yourselves with mindful breathing and relax your body

Take a pilgrim stone with you as you start the walk. As you walk reflect upon your pilgrimage journey ask yourself;

- A How has the journey brought you peace?
- how will you take that peace into your daily life?
- What are the barriers to you finding peace in your life?
- ♦ How can as sense of peace provide renewed hope in your life?

After making your way through the labyrinth and returning to the start stop and reflect, leave your pilgrim stone by the Charism Walk.




