From little things big things are possible - with God on our side

This week the Scriptures invite us to reflect deeply on the nature of faith- what it means to believe, to trust and to serve. In a world often marked by uncertainty and hardship, today's readings speak to our longing for assurance and strength. They remind us that faith is not about having all the answers but about remaining steadfast in God's promises. They remind us that even if our faith is tiny, like that of a mustard seed, allowing God to work in us and through us, will achieve so much more than we can ever imagine possible.

In Luke's gospel (17:5-10) we see the apostles imploring Jesus to increase their faith. The apostles already believed in Jesus and were growing in discipleship. They had responded to his invitation to follow him. They had seen him work powerfully, healing and performing miracles that transformed and freed people. They wanted desperately to have the faith of Jesus, that deep relationship of trust and love that existed between Jesus and the Father.

Jesus's response to his disciples is interesting. He seems to bypass their request for an increase in faith, drawing attention instead to the quality of their faith. He reminds them that faith the size of a tiny mustard seed is all they need. It is enough to uproot a mulberry tree and plant it in the sea. Even the smallest amount of genuine faith is powerful beyond all human measure because it is not about us; rather it is based in the One in whom we place our trust. A mustard seed of real faith, faith rooted in God, can do the impossible.

Mustard seed faith grows out of our willingness to engage in a relationship with God, daring to believe that God who is total goodness desires to be actively involved in our lives, working for us, with us and beside us. This is the relationship of faith that Jesus lived. This is the faith that has the power to reach hearts and change lives. It moves us beyond a purely intellectual acceptance of God, or affirmation of a creed or belief that certain doctrines are true and orthodox. It takes our belief in Jesus to an actioning of the faith of Jesus, the living out of a profound relationship of trust, surrender and dependence upon the Source of Love and Life.

The parable that comes at the end of this gospel passage concerns the servant who does that which is expected of them with no expectation of thanks or reward. We are reminded that faith is not about earning God's favour of applause. It is about living in obedience and love, doing right simply because it is right, even when no one notices.

In the first reading today (Habakkuk1:2-3, 2:2-4) we are given an insight into the faith relationship between the prophet Habakkuk and God. Before God, Habakkuk could bring his struggles, concerns, anger, fearfulness, pain and suffering. He was not afraid to be authentic and demanded that God do something. God meets Habakkuk where he is at and invites him to patient faithfulness and provision of all wait, for come it will without fail the upright man will live by his faithfulness."

Faith is not the absence of doubt or struggle. It is the decision to remain rooted in God despite them. In today's second reading from Timothy (1:6-8, 13-14) Paul understands faith to be a gift given by God to those who believe. However, it is fire that must be tended. Left untended, buried under fear, distraction or discouragement, faith ceases to be a source of strength, courage and love. It remains a gift unused and wasted.

May we fan into a flame the gift of faith that we each have received and remember that we have been given the Spirit of power, love and self- control. May our faith, however small it may seem, carry us forward to sustain us in trials and bear witness to the God who is always faithful.

Pope Leo XIV, during his first full interview since his election, has responded to many questions about his view on various matters. The article reporting on this interview was published on the Catholic Outlook site just recently. Some of the topics were as follows

The role of the Papacy. Although internal church governance is a major part, the most important thing is the **pastoral role** that the church should always demonstrate. Pope Francis was forever stressing this with all the clergy. The role is one of building bridges, avoiding polarisation.

The Roman Curia. He acknowledged that any human organisation is always in need of some reform and noted the great work Francis had done in this regard. The various Departments of the Curia had tended to act as silos with scant communication between each other. Francis had been quite successful in turning this around but more work needs to be done.

The finances. As Pope Leo said, "I don't know how I am going to handle it yet but I'm getting some clear ideas." Francis had much success in this area, especially with the work done by Cardinal Pell. Pope Leo is well aware of how challenging continued reform in this area will be.

The role of women in the Church. He sees no change in the Church's position on the ordination of women. With respect to women becoming Deacons he has no intention, at this time, of changing the Church's teaching on the matter. However he will continue to appoint women to leadership roles at various levels of decision-making.

The 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C offers us various lessons through its readings. Each reading provides insights into how we live and believe as Christians.

Living by Faith: The prophet Habakkuk questions God about the suffering he sees. God responds by telling him to wait for a vision that promises justice. This teaches us that faith involves trusting God's timing and plan, even when we don't understand.

Gift of the Spirit: In the second reading, Paul encourages Timothy to use the gifts God has given him. This reminds us that God equips us with spiritual gifts, and we should use them boldly and lovingly.

Power of Small Faith: Jesus mentions that faith as small as a mustard seed can do great things. It shows us that the size of our faith is less important than its true presence and action in our lives.

Duty and Service: The Gospel also compares faith to a servant doing his duty. It teaches us that following Jesus means serving without expecting rewards; our actions are part of our Christian duty.

Vision and Persistence: Habakkuk is told to write down a vision clearly. This tells us that having a clear vision and persistence in faith can guide us through challenges and uncertainties.

Courage in Witnessing: Paul's words to Timothy highlight the need for courage in proclaiming our faith. This encourages us to be strong and persistent in sharing our belief with others.

These themes from the 27th Sunday in Ordinary Time Year C encourage us to reflect on our faith and duties as Christians. They guide us in living out our beliefs in practical and faithful ways.
