The Feast of Christ the King invites us to contemplate what true kingship looks like in the light of the Gospel. Throughout history, kingship has often been associated with power, wealth, and dominion.

In 313 Constantine declared that Christianity to be the state religion. No one could hold any other belief. Constantine's kingship was entrenched in imperial authority, military strength, and political strategy. The cross became a banner under which armies marched, and Christianity gained prominence through imperial domination. On the positive side, it stopped the persecution of the earliest Christians. The witness of the martyrs had caused even a few emperors to ask what sort of love would see so many followers be prepared to die for their beliefs. It also saw the Church become a significant player in shaping the values of society.

On the other side, the Church became very powerful very quickly. Bishops started to wear the purple robes of the senators. Churches took on the shape of the Roman basilicas, while the government of the Church reflected that of the Empire. Unfortunately, for the next few hundred years, many conversions were demanded at the end of a sword. No religious dissent was tolerated. The problem with all this is not that imperial language was now being used in reference to Jesus. The problem comes in how Christianity starts to forget that Jesus also pointed out that his kingdom was 'not of this world' and that his nobles could be recognised by how they feed the hungry, give the thirsty something to drink, welcome strangers, clothe the naked, care for the sick and visit prisoners. Jesus' kingship and his followers are a different order to those seen in worldly kingdoms.

When we turn to Christ the King, we encounter a radically different vision to kingship. Jesus does not rule from a throne of gold but from the wood of the cross. His crown is not of jewels but of thorns. His power is not enforced by legions but expressed in self-giving love.

Where Constantine's kingship sought to unify an empire through law and might, Christ's kingship seeks to gather all people through mercy and truth. The contrast could not be sharper: one reigns by conquest, the other by sacrifice.

That's why this feast is so important. We are challenged by Christ our King to give our true allegiance to what really matters. Not ambition, greed, status and power, but the quiet revolutionary work of making the world a more just and peaceful place for everyone to live.

Jesus Christ still lives as king, in thousands of human hearts all over the world. His citizens need obey only one major law: "Love God in Loving one another as Jesus did." His love is selfless, sacrificial, kind, compassionate, forgiving and unconditional. The heart of Christ's kingship: service, humility, and love that costs everything. His authority is not imposed but offered. He does not demand allegiance through fear but invites trust through tenderness.

This feast is an invitation to all of us who have power or authority of any kind to compare our use with that of Jesus. Are we using our power to serve others or to manipulate? Are we using our power in any way that might cause pain to others or in a way that could help to ease pain?

### **FAITH MATTERS - GSM**

On this feast of Christ the King, the last day of the 2025 Church Liturgical Year, let's look briefly at Dilexi te, ('On Love for the Poor') recently published by Pope Leo XIV, which sets out the Catholic response to wealth and poverty. Actually it was written by Pope Francis and edited and endorsed by Pope Leo. Pope Francis had taken his papal name from Francis of Assisi - the servant of the poor. He and Pope Leo had a burning desire to always be on the side of the poor and marginalised.

What follows are some excerpts from a piece written by Fr. Hamilton S.J. and taken from the Catholic Outlook website in Parramatta Diocese, Sydney. According to Fr. Hamilton, four aspects stand out in Dilexi te.

- First. Selecting and telling stories always involves retelling them. In presenting Catholic Social Teaching, for example, Dilexi te, offers a brief summary of the Church teaching before the Second Vatican Council, emphasises the Council's attention to the poor, and devotes most attention to the Latin American conferences which emphasised the central place of the poor in the Church. Archbishop Romero embodied this view. Once marginalised among Catholics, he and the poor lie at the heart of faith.
- Second. The positions and people with whom Dilexi te takes issue are Catholics who disregard or minimise the central part of the poor in their faith. Allied to them are those infected by the wider culture whose social and political views emphasise the individual over the common good, see individual and national wealth as the measure of a good society, and regard the poor as defective or as expendable.
- Third. The document reminds us that, in Australia, inequality and the attitudes it feeds are common. It points to the enormity of the task of moving the centre of culture from individuals and their interests to their relationships within the community. This change is needed to notice and reach out to the poor. Dilexi te demonstrates how counter-cultural is the genuinely Christian response. It also makes it attractive.
- Fourth. The most notable feature of Dilexi te is that Pope Francis has not only helped publish and put his name to such a radical document but has fully

#### LAUDATO SI'



The authors of Break Open the Word Liturgy Brisbane 2024 (p.147) note the horrifying irony and "deep shock" of encountering Christ on the cross in today's Gospel. This points to the Christian paradigm shift about power. The imperial soldiers' mocking sign in Latin, Hebrew, and Greek (King of the Jews) points to the universality of the shift, that the path to glory lies through suffering and leadership and it means laying down your life in service. Paul is quoting an early Christian liturgical hymn about Christ that is cosmic in scope, God-in-Christ is the head of the whole of creation. COP30 in Belem is a meeting of most of the 'empires' of the physical world. Nearly 200 countries and over 56.000 official registrants, very many groups, faith-based and 70,000 marchers, including land rights holders of the Amazon basin, are in dialogue. At issue is truth, justice, peace, and integrity of creation. Many are explicitly engaging with this science, politics, faith complex through the lens of Laudato Si' and an integral-ecology paradigm.
